Dear Families,

I thought you might be interested in knowing what is happening on the curriculum front. A few weeks back, I identified eight curriculum studies that we would undertake. They include- A study of the work of Robert Marzano, a longitudinal ITBS study, a Math study, a Reading study, a Science study, a Catholic identity study and an SLE alignment and assessment study. The largest of these is a Language Arts In-depth study that I project will take up to two years. The faculty signed up to serve on study teams.

The plan is to have the faculty teams look at data, instructional effectiveness, to study student performance over time (including a look at the effectiveness of our intervention programs), teaching strategies, as well as conversations with our local high schools to better position us to take our instruction to the next level. Great work was done last year and the year prior in preparation for the accreditation study. We will build upon that. The work done over the last few years regarding differentiated instruction has also been done. This provides an additional foundation to build upon.

I would like to also emphasize that I place on the importance of further developing in the students, an understanding of the importance of creativity in their studies. This goes along with encouraging curiosity and the enjoyment of learning. What I hope we achieve is this: to build upon that which is already here and to take our students to even higher levels of achievement while celebrating a learning culture. While doing this, our excellent faculty will provide the means to achieve this through their collective efforts and collaborative conversation. My role includes that of nurturing and encouraging the conversations through a structured forum that is valued and affirmed.

The Dominicans who staffed this school for many decades before the laity took their place have a saying in Latin: Contemplari et templata aliis tradere

which translates-to study and hand on the fruits of study.

THE UPCOMING CHANGES IN THE MASS.

This weekend Patrick Barredo will speak at all Masses at the homily time to make a final summary of the changes that begin next weekend. Patrick has spent a great deal of time preparing for these new translations and he published the new wording in the bulletin over the past couple of months. Since Patrick is a layperson who is in the pews with his family like everyone else I have asked him to present to all who are in the same situation as he is. As soon as the new Breaking Bread books go into the pews next week for the beginning of Advent all the new words and music will be in those books and the bits of paper can go away.

In a recent publication from a catholic book company under the title "The Challenge and Promise of Change", author Mathew Kelly writes: "Change is one of the laws of the natural universe. Nature teaches us that everything in this world is constantly changing. Everything God created is constantly in the process of either growing or dying". Still, he writes, there are certain things that never change: "Truth does not change; the supernatural realities of faith, hope and love do not change; and God does not change".

So, while we have some changed wording the essential truth of our faith is still the same.

You will find that the priest has most of the change in what he reads and prays. The biggest change of all in that regard is that the priest is supposed to sing more parts of the Mass! That is a big challenge for Fr Raschko and me both, since neither of us are much good at leading congregational singing and we will be slow at any increase in our leading. Those who told me in the recent questionnaires that there is already too much singing will be happy to at least know you wont be hearing much singing from us --- unless the Liturgical police show up to challenge us over this!

I am sure we will all find some of it a bit awkward at first; I will most likely feel I

am not experiencing it as prayer when I stumble through it but I bet we will get used to it in time.

MY REVIEW.

Last Monday was the first part of the review of my time at Holy Rosary. This was a site visit with a number of people from Councils and Commissions. The second part will be a more detailed questionnaire that will be sent out possibly next week to a cross section of parishioners whom the Archdiocese will randomly select from our parish list. The final part will be a one on one meeting for me with the Archdiocesan representative who will ask me questions that may be similar to the questionnaire that goes out. I say "possibly" and "may" because I don't know exactly how this goes until it happens. Thank you to all who take part.

Our Lord Jesus Christ the King-Nov 20, 2011

Sunday is the solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. As the Church's year ends, our thoughts turn to the end of time, when Jesus will gather his people into glory. We use images and symbols to think about those events because no one knows exactly how it will come about. We say that it will be like a king welcoming people who have been on a long journey to his kingdom. But we do not have to wait until the end of time to become members of that kingdom. Christ our king has come to us! As the book of Revelation says, Jesus "is Lord overall lords and King over all kings. His followers are chosen and special and

faithful" (16:14). Look at Matthew's gospel as an example: it begins with the wise men seeking the "king of the Jews," and ends with Pilate asking "Are you the king of the Jews?" In between those two scenes are stories of people who knew the answer to that question. Jesus explained to everyone that his kingdom is not like worldly kingdoms, where rulers abuse power and burden their people. He does not rule with armies but with truth. He does not have a great palace but a great heart. In his kingdom the oppressed become free, the poor inherit the land, the merciful receive mercy, and the hungry eat like queens and kings. (Just in time for Thanksgiving!)
